



Safety and Regulatory Information

IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

- **Read This Before You Begin** When using your equipment, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock, and injury to persons, including the following:

- This device must be installed and used in strict accordance with manufacturer's instructions, as described in the user documentation that is included with the device.

 device
- To prevent fire or shock hazard, do not expose this device to rain or moisture. The device must not be exposed to dripping or splashing. Do not place objects filled with liquids, such as vases, on the device.
- This device was qualified under test conditions that included the use of the supplied cables between system components. To ensure regulatory and safety compliance, use only the provided power and interface cables and install them properly.
- Different types of cord sets may be used for connections to the main POWER supply circuit. Use only a main line cord that complies with all applicable device safety requirements of the country of use.

- Postpone installation until there is no risk of thunderstorm or lightning activity in the area.

Getting Started

Introduction

The Motorola SURFboard® SVG6x82 Series Wireless Voice Gateway is a combination wireless cable modem and router with VoIP capabilities that provides wireless high-speed data and multimedia service access on your home network. The SVG6x82 includes a Wi-Fi Pairing option for quick and easy connections for your wireless devices.

This guide provides instructions for installing and configuring the SVG6x82, setting up a secure wireless network connection, and managing your gateway and network configurations.

Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS) is a wireless network setup option that provides a quick and easy solution for setting up a secure wireless network connection for any WPS-enabled device; such as a computer or printer. WPS automatically configures your wireless network connections and sets up wireless security.




Figure 2 – SVG6x82 Rear View

Gateway Label

The SVG6x82 gateway product label is located on the bottom of the gateway. It contains unique gateway ID information that you may need when contacting your service provider.



To receive Internet access, you may have to provide the following information listed on the gateway label:

- Gateway model number (SVG6582 or SVG6682)
- MAC address (**HFC MAC ID**)
- Gateway serial number (S/N)
- Wi-Fi Security Key

Installing the Gateway



- This product is for indoor use only. Do not route the Ethernet cable outside of the building. Exposure of the cables to lightning could create a safety hazard and damage the product.
- Contact your cable service provider before connecting your gateway to existing telephone wiring. DO NOT connect the telephone cable from the TEL port to a traditional telephone (PSTN) service; only connect it to a telephone.

Connecting to Your Computer

Before installing the SVG6x82:

- Check with your service provider to ensure high-speed Internet service is available in your area. A
 high-speed Internet connection provided by an Internet service provider is needed to set up a wireless
 network.
- Choose a central location in your home where your computer and gateway are preferably near existing cable and electrical wall outlets.
- Make sure your computer is powered OFF.

Note: The following procedure steps you through the wired Ethernet connection process to make sure the gateway is properly connected and your network access is working.




Figure 4 - SVG6x82 Connection Diagram

- 1. Check that a coaxial cable is connected to a cable wall outlet or RF splitter.
- 2. Connect the other end of the coaxial cable to the Cable connector on the gateway. Hand-tighten the connectors to avoid damaging them.



- 3. Connect the Ethernet cable to any open Ethernet port on the gateway.
- 4. Connect the other end of the Ethernet cable to the Ethernet port on your computer. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for each additional computer or other device.
- 5. Plug the telephone cord of a single- or two-line telephone into your telephone.
- 6. Plug the other end of the telephone cord into the TEL 1 port on the gateway.
- 7. Use the TEL 1 port to connect two-line telephones.
 - **Note**: Contact a VoIP service provider to activate this service.
- 8. For a second telephone, plug the telephone cord of a single-line telephone into the TEL 2 port on the gateway.
- 9. Plug the power cord into the Power port on the gateway.
- 10. Plug the other end of the power cord into an electrical wall outlet. This automatically powers ON the gateway.

Testing the Gateway Connections

Perform the following gateway connectivity test to verify that all the components were connected properly:

- 1. Power ON your computer and then log on.
- 2. Check that all the LEDs on the front panel of the gateway first FLASH in sequential order and then light SOLID. See **Front Panel** for additional LED status information.
 - If an LED did not light SOLID, contact your service provider for assistance.
- 3. Contact your service provider to activate (provision) the gateway.
 - **Note**: Your service provider may allow for automatic activation which will automatically launch a special website when you open a web browser.
- 4. Once your gateway is provisioned, open a web browser on your computer, such as Internet Explorer, Firefox, Google Chrome, or Safari.
- 5. Type a valid URL (for example, **www.motorola.com**) in the address bar and then click or press **Enter**.
 - If the web page did not open, contact your service provider for assistance or proceed to **Connecting the Gateway to the Internet** to manually set up the network options on your computer.

Setting Up an Internet Connection

IMPORTANT! Your computer may already be configured to automatically connect to the Internet. If so, **do not** change the network options before contacting your service provider for assistance.

If you cannot access the Internet after completing the gateway installation, you may have to manually set up your computer to connect to the Internet. To do this, you will have to enable the network options on your computer to automatically obtain an IP address and DNS server address.

Please note, operating system-specific commands for configuring computer network options are not provided in this document.



The general steps provided below can be used for the following Microsoft Windows platforms:

- Windows 7
- Windows Vista
- Windows XP

For specific commands, refer to the documentation for the Windows operating system running on your computer for specific commands.

 Click the Start button from the Taskbar on your desktop and then click Control Panel and Network Connections.

Note: Additional selections may be necessary for Windows 7 systems.

- 2. Step through to open the Local Area Connection Properties window.
- 3. Select **Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)** option and click **Properties** to open the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties window.
- 4. Select Obtain an IP address automatically and Obtain DNS server address automatically.
- 5. Click **OK** to save the TCP/IP settings and close the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties window.
- 6. Step through to close the remaining windows and exit.
- 7. To verify the IP address, open a command prompt window using the **Start** button from the Taskbar on your desktop.
- 8. Type **ipconfig** and press **Enter** to display the IP configuration.
- 9. To renew the IP address, type **ipconfig /renew** and press **Enter**. A new IP address for your computer will display.
- 10. Type **exit** and then press **Enter** to return to Windows.

If you still cannot access the Internet, contact your service provider.





Setting Up a Wireless Network Connection

You must have computer access to a high-speed Internet service to set up a wireless network connection or connect wireless devices to the SVG6x82. Also, make sure the SVG6x82 and your computer are connected through an Ethernet connection. Choose one of the following two options to set up your wireless network connection:

- Setting Up a Wireless Network on Your Computer
- Using the WPS Pairing Button

After setting up your wireless network connection, check that the wireless network connection was set up properly. See **Testing Your Wireless Network Connection** for more information.

Setting Up a Wireless Network on Your Computer

Note: The steps for setting up a wireless network may differ slightly depending on the Windows operating system installed on your computer. The following steps apply for Windows 7 systems.

- From the Windows taskbar, click Start button and then click Control Panel, Network and Sharing Center.
- 2. Click Set up a new connection or network.
- 3. Click Connect to the Internet.

Note: The **You are already connected to the Internet** message may appear. Ignore this message and proceed with the next step.

- 4. Click Set up a new connection anyway and then click Wireless.
- 5. Scroll down and click the **MOTOROLA** wireless network name (see the **SSID** number listed on the SVG6x82 gateway label).
- 6. Enter **Network security key code** in the Security key field (see **Wi-Fi Security** code listed on the SVG6x82 gateway label) and then click **OK** to complete the wireless network connection.
 - A Connected status message showing the wireless network connection should display.
- 7. Close the Wireless Network Connection window.

Using the WPS Pairing Button

Note: To use the WPS Pairing button option, your computer hardware must support WPS and also have WPA security compatibility.

The WPS option automatically assigns a random wireless network name (SSID) and Wi-Fi Security Key to the SVG6x82 and other WPS-enabled devices to connect to your wireless network.

- 1. Power ON the gateway and other WPS-enabled devices that you want to connect to a wireless network.
- 2. Press and hold the WPS button located on the top of the SVG6x82 for five or more seconds.
- 3. Press the WPS button on your WPS-enabled computer or other device.
- 4. Repeat step 3 for each additional WPS-enabled device you are connecting to your wireless network.



Testing Your Wireless Network Connection

Perform the following test to verify that the SVG6x82 and other wireless devices can connect to your wireless network:

- 1. If connected, disconnect the Ethernet cable from your computer and the SVG6x82.
- 2. Open a web browser on your computer.
- 3. Type a valid URL (for example, **www.motorola.com/us**) in the address bar, and then click or press **Enter**.

If the web page did not open, please contact your service provider for assistance.





Accessing the Gateway

Use the SVG6x82 Modem Web Manager to view the various configuration settings and operational status of the gateway.

Starting the Gateway Web Manager

Note: Use the following default username and password to log on to the SVG6x82 Web Manager for the first time. For network security purposes, it is recommended that you change the user name and password after logging on. See Changing the Default Password for more information.

- 1. Open any web browser on the computer connected to the SVG6x82.
- 2. In the Address bar, type http://192.168.0.1 for the Gateway Web Manager IP address, and then press **Enter**. The gateway Login window displays.
- 3. Type the default username and password. Both entries are case-sensitive.

4. Click **Login** to open the SVG6x82 Web Manager. The SVG6x82 Status Connection page displays.






Figure 6 - SVG6x82 Status Connection Page

The Status Connection page provides the following information relating to the SVG6x82 network connection:

- Downstream Bonded Channels use lower cable frequencies to transmit data
- Upstream Bonded Channel use higher cable frequencies to receive data

Note: Click **Refresh** (press **F5**) in your web browser any time you want to update the information on this page.



To prevent unauthorized access and configuration to your wireless network, it is recommended that you immediately change the default password after logging on to the gateway for the first time. See Changing the Default User Name and Password for more information.

Protecting Your Wireless Network

After you have successfully connected the SBG7682 and your wireless devices, you should configure the gateway to protect your wireless network from unwanted and unauthorized access. Use the SVG6x82 web-based configuration manager to change various default configuration settings on the SVG6x82.

Note: If your gateway was obtained as part of a service package, your service provider may require alternative configuration methods. If you cannot access any of the HTML pages in the SVG6x82 Web Manager, please contact your service provider for assistance.

Changing the Default User Name and Password



To prevent unauthorized access and configuration to your wireless network, it is recommended that you immediately change the default password after logging on to the gateway for the first time.

The most important recommendation towards securing your wireless home network is to change the default administrator password on your SVG6x82 and other wireless devices as well.

To ensure that your wireless home network is secure, it is recommended that you follow these best practices:

- Always create a secure password that is not easily guessed
- Use phrases instead of names that may be easier for you to remember
- Use a combination of upper and lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols
- Continue to change your admin password on a regular basis

To change the default user name and password:

- 1. Log in to the SGB6782 from any web browser on your computer.
- 2. Type the Gateway Web Manager IP address, http://192.168.0.1, in the Address bar and then press Enter. The gateway Login window displays.
- 3. Type the default username and password as they appear below.

Username: **admin**Password: **motorola**

- 4. Click **Login** to open the SVG6x82 Web Manager. The SVG6x82 Status Connection page displays.
- 5. Click **Security** from the Status submenu options on the left side of the page. The Status Security page displays.

- 6. Check that **Change Username** is displayed in the selection box.
- 7. Complete each field entry, but note the following:
 - o All fields (for example, Current Username & Password) are case-sensitive
 - o Note: For first-time logons, the Current Username is admin, Current Password is motorola
 - o Username is your current user name
 - o Make sure No is selected for Restore Factory Defaults.
- 8. Click **Apply** to update your user name.
- 9. Click Change Username drop-down arrow to display Change Password.

- o Make sure No is selected for Restore Factory Defaults.
- o Find a secure place to write down and keep your new password

Setting Up the Firewall

You can use the Firewall pages to configure the SVG6x82 firewall filters and firewall alert notifications on your wireless network. The firewall protects the SVG6x82 LAN from undesired attacks and other intrusions from the Internet.

The firewall:

- Maintains state data for every TCP/IP session on the OSI network and transport layers.
- Monitors all incoming and outgoing packets, applies the firewall policy to each one, and pages for improper packets and intrusion attempts.
- Provides comprehensive logging for all
 - o User authentications
 - o Rejected internal and external connection requests
 - Session creation and termination
 - o Outside attacks (intrusion detection)

You can also configure the firewall filters to set rules for port usage.



Basic Firewall

The Web Content Filter page has various settings related to blocking or exclusively allowing different types of data through the CMRG from the WAN to the LAN. There are three security firewall protection levels (low, medium, and high) which correspond to the number of services allowed.

Firewall Protection turns ON the Stateful Packet Inspection (SPI) firewall features. Block Fragmented IP packets prevents all fragmented IP packets from passing through the firewall. Port Scan Detection detects and blocks port scan activity originating on both the LAN and WAN. IP Flood Detection detects and blocks packet floods originating on both the LAN and WAN.

You can block Java Applets, Cookies, ActiveX controls, popup windows, and Proxies. Firewall Protection turns on the Stateful Packet Inspection (SPI) firewall features.

To open the Firewall Basic Web Content Filter page:

- 1. Click **Firewall** on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **Basic** from the Status submenu options.




Figure 11 - Firewall Basic Web Content Filter Page

- 3. Click the Firewall Protection drop-down to select the protection level or turn OFF security protection.
 - o High Safest configuration, highest security
 - o Medium Common configuration, modest risk
 - o Low Minimum security, higher risk
 - o Off No security, highest risk
- 4. Click **Enable** for each Web filter you want to set for the firewall and then click **Apply**.

Firewall Web Filter

The Firewall web filter page allows you to filter outbound connections, restrict or grant access to specified MAC addresses. To open the Firewall Web Filtering page:

- 1. Click Firewall on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click Web Filter from the Status submenu options.
- 3. Click **Create** and enter the information for each web filter you want to create.






Figure 12 - Firewall Web Filtering Page

Firewall Local Log

You can set up email to enable automatic email alerts. The Local Event Log can send out firewall attack reports in two ways:

- Individual emails are sent out automatically each time the firewall is under attack
- A local log is stored within the gateway and displayed in table form on the Local Log page Individual emails will now be sent to the specified address each time an attack is detected.
- To open the Firewall Local Log page:
- 1. Click Firewall on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **Local Log** from the Status submenu options.




Figure 13 – Firewall Local Log Page

- 3. Enter your email address for the Contact Email Address field.
- 4. Enter the SMTP email account, user name, and password in the next fields.
 - **Note**: The Outgoing) mail server address is provided b your service provider.
- 5. Select **Enable** checkbox if you want to receive firewall email alerts, and then click **Apply**.
- 6. Click **E-mail Log** to send a summary of the Event Log Table to the contact specified contact email address.
- 7. Click **Clear Log** to clear the table.



Firewall Remote Log

This Firewall configuration sends firewall attack reports to a standard SysLog server so that multiple instances can be logged over a period of time. You can select individual attack or configuration items to send to the SysLog server so that only the items of interest will be monitored. You can log any of the following:

- **Permitted connections** Select to have the server e-mail you logs of who is connecting to your network
- **Blocked connections** Select to have the server e-mail you logs of who is blocked from connecting to your network.
- **Known Internet attack types** Select to have the server e-mail you logs of known Internet attacks against your network.
- **Product configuration events** Select to have the server e-mail you logs of the basic product configuration events logs.

Note: The SysLog server must be on the same network as the Private LAN behind the Configuration Manager (typically **192.168.0.x**).

To open the Firewall Remote Log page:

- 1. Click **Firewall** on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **Remote Log** from the Status submenu options.




Figure 14 – Firewall Remote Log Page

- 3. Select all the desired event types that you want to monitor.
- 4. Enter the last byte (from 10 to 254) of the IP address of the SysLog server.

Note: Normally, the IP address of this SysLog server is hard-coded so that the address does not change and always agrees with the entry on this page.

5. Click Apply.



Setting Up the DMZ Host

The DMZ (De-militarized Zone) is a computer or small sub-network located outside the firewall, between the trusted internal private LAN and the untrusted public Internet that prevents direct access by outside users to private data. DMZ host lets you specify the default recipient of WAN traffic that NAT is unable to translate to a known local computer.

You can configure one computer to be the DMZ host. This setting is generally used for computers using problem applications that use random port numbers and do not function correctly with specific port triggers or the port forwarding setups. If you set up a computer as a DMZ Host, set this back to zero when you are finished with the needed application, since this computer will be effectively exposed to the public Internet, though still protected from Denial of Service (DoS) attacks via the Firewall.

For example, you can set up a web server on a DMZ computer to enable outside users to access your website without exposing confidential data on your network.

A DMZ is also useful to play interactive games that may have a problem running through a firewall. You can leave a computer used for gaming only exposed to the Internet while protecting the rest of your network.

To open the DMZ Host page:

- 1. Click **Advanced** on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **DMZ Host** from the Status submenu options.

- 3. Enter the last byte (from **10** to **254**) of the IP address of the computer you want to set up as the DMZ host.
- 4. Click **Apply** to activate the selected computer.





Monitoring Your Network

Use the SVG6x82 Status pages to obtain information about the gateway hardware and software, MAC address, gateway IP address, serial number; and to monitor the gateway system connection.

Viewing the Gateway Software Information

The Software status page displays information about the hardware version, software version, MAC address, cable modem IP address, serial number, system "up" time, and network registration status. To open the Status Software page:

- 1. Click **Status** on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **Software** from the Status submenu options.




Figure 16 - SVG6x82 Status Software Page

Viewing the Gateway Status

The Status Connection page displays information about the RF upstream and downstream channels, including downstream channel frequency, upstream channel ID, and upstream and downstream signal power and modulation.

This page also displays IP lease information, including the current IP address of the cable modem, the duration of both leases, the expiration time of both leases, and the current system time from the DOCSIS timeserver.

To open the Status Connection page:

- 1. Click **Status** on the SVG6x82 Menu Options bar.
- 2. Click **Connection** from the Status submenu options.




Figure 17 - SVG6x82 Status Connection Page



Backing up Your Gateway Configuration

- 4. Click **Backup** to create a backup file of your SVG6x82 configuration settings.

Restoring Your Gateway Configuration

You can restore a previously saved configuration setting (usually named **GatewaySettings.bin**, unless you renamed it before saving). If necessary, you can reset the SVG6x82 gateway configuration to its original factory settings.
